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One Kansas City Radio partners with Kansas State School for the Blind to air a student-led Discover Podcasting show

KANSAS CITY, KANSAS — One Kansas City Radio 100.1 FM and Kansas State School for the Blind (KSSB) have teamed up to air the student-led KSSB Discover Podcasting show on live radio this fall.

Founded in 2020, the club encourages creativity, communication, and technology skills for students who are blind or visually impaired. Students use assistive technology to independently record and edit the shows from start to finish.

“The podcast is truly something to be proud of. No other School for the Blind has a student-led podcast, let alone one with nearly [30] episodes.” shared KSSB Superintendent, Jon Harding.



Listeners of Season 1 episodes will learn from guests such as accessible technologists, blind musicians, visually impaired professional athletes, and KSSB students themselves. The partnership will share student voices and hopes to expand to include more hands-on experiences for KSSB students in audio production. Rich, a KSSB graduate and former host of KSSB Discover Podcasting ensures: *“The one thing we can’t do is see, [but] even though we can’t see, our podcast has a vision.”*

Original shows can be heard on One Kansas City Radio Mondays at 10 a.m. on 100.1 FM or at onekcradio.org beginning September 5. KSSB Discover Podcasting is actively planning Season 2 for the 2022-2023 school year.
